MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING
between

Cornell University, Ithaca, New York (USA)
and
Zhejiang University, Hangzhou (China)

General

In order to facilitate international academic exchange, to develop academic and scientific relationships, and in support of collaborative research activities, Cornell University (hereinafter “Cornell”) and Zhejiang University, (herein after “Zhejiang”) agree to establish this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) as a framework for cooperative programs. The terms of cooperation for each specific activity implemented under this MOU, including financial aspects, shall be mutually discussed and agreed upon in writing by both parties prior to the initiation of that activity.

Project Agreements

The terms of cooperation for each specific activity implemented under this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), including financial aspects, shall be mutually discussed and agreed upon in writing by both parties prior to the initiation of that activity. These Project Agreements shall be subject to the terms of this MOU and shall be attached hereto in Appendices.

Academic Freedom

Generally accepted principles of academic freedom will be applicable to all educational and research activities undertaken by, or under the direction of, faculty who participate in the projects contemplated by this MOU.

Non-Discrimination

Cornell and Zhejiang agree not to discriminate against any person because of age, ancestry, color, disability or handicap, national origin, race, religious creed, sex, sexual orientation, or veteran status. However, participants will be cognizant of and abide by the laws of the host country. Cornell and Zhejiang shall abide by these principles in the administration of this MOU, and neither institution shall impose criteria for the exchange of faculty or students which would violate the principles of non-discrimination. Breach of this covenant may be regarded as a material breach of this Memorandum of Understanding and any related agreements.

Intellectual Property

Each party to this MOU shall own the intellectual property (IP) conceived or first reduced to practice solely by its employees or agents in furtherance of projects or activities contemplated by this MOU. IP conceived or first reduced to practice jointly by employees or agents of both parties shall be jointly owned.

Export Compliance

The parties hereto agree to comply with all applicable United States export laws and regulations. Unless authorized by applicable government license or regulation, neither party will directly or indirectly export or re-export, at any time any technical information or software, furnished or developed under this MOU to any prohibited country (including release of such technical information or software to nationals, wherever they may be located, of any prohibited country) as specified in applicable United States export, embargo, and sanctions regulations.

Indemnification

Cornell and Zhejiang shall each indemnify and hold harmless the other, its officers, agents and employees, for any and all liability, damages and cost attributable to the negligent acts or omissions of the indemnifying party, its officers, agents and employees while acting in the scope of their employment, and in furtherance of activities described in this Memorandum of Understanding. Students are not employees or agents of Cornell or Zhejiang for purposes of this Agreement.

Insurance

Each party shall maintain its own liability insurance in amounts deemed appropriate for its operations. Such insurance shall provide coverage for negligent acts, errors, or omissions and provide protection against bodily injury or property damage claims. It is expressly understood that each party shall be solely responsible for its own actions and such insurance shall not extend to protect any other party.

Students and others participating in programs contemplated by this MOU will be required to provide proof of adequate health insurance valid in the host country and acceptable to the host institution.

Conduct

Exchange faculty and students must abide by the laws of the host country affecting foreign nationals, and by the rules and regulations of the host university.

Use of Name

Any use of the name Cornell University including any of its constituent colleges or programs, or Cornell related logos in advertisements, publications or notices relating in any way to the activities described in this MOU shall be subject to the prior written approval of Cornell University.

Any use of the name Zhejiang including any of its constituent colleges or programs, or Zhejiang related logos in advertisements, publications or notices relating in any way to the activities described in this MOU shall be subject to the prior written approval of Zhejiang.

Non-Assignment

Neither party to this Agreement shall have the right to assign any duty or responsibility arising hereunder without the written consent of the other party.

Relationship of Parties

This Agreement shall not be construed to create a relationship of partners, employees, servants or agents as between parties. The parties to this Agreement are acting as independent contractors.

Designee/Notice

The below named individuals are representatives of the respective parties responsible for the development and coordination of the specific activities contemplated by this MOU. All notices or communications hereunder should be directed to the below named persons unless another addressee is hereinafter designated by written notice.

Application of Law

The parties will consult with each other and attempt to resolve disputes or misunderstandings that arise in the administration of this MOU or any Project Agreement informally. It is expected that informal attempts will prove successful. In the event that informal attempts at resolution are not successful, the parties agree that all claims or actions, related to, or arising out of, activities described in this MOU or any Project Agreement shall be brought in the International Chamber of Commerce's Court of Arbitration to compose an arbitration tribunal of three arbitrators to make final ruling in accordance with the arbitration rules then in effect. The Principles of International Commercial Contracts developed by UNIDROIT in 2004 shall apply, except for those of tort liability, where the laws of the place of tort conduct shall apply. In the event Cornell is the party initiating the claim or action the place of arbitration shall be Hong Kong China. If Zhejiang is the party initiating the claim or action, the place of arbitration shall be New York, New York USA. The arbitration language shall be English, and English shall be considered the language in which the contract was originally drawn.

Travel Warning Countries

When student exchange involves Cornell undergraduate students traveling to a country under a U.S. Department of State Travel Warning, such travel requires prior approval from Cornell's International Travel Advisory and Response Team (ITART). Should the exchange not be approved, modifications to the originally proposed exchange schedule to address the concerns of ITART will be mutually agreed upon in writing.

Termination

This MOU or any Project Agreement can be terminated at any time for material breach upon provision of written notice and a reasonable opportunity to cure. Termination may also occur for any reason upon 6 months written notice, in which case all reasonable efforts shall be made to minimize disruption of work under existing Project Agreements.

Effective Date/Term

This MOU shall become effective upon signature of all parties and shall expire 5 years after such date unless there are active project agreements operating under this MOU, in which case the MOU will be automatically extended until the termination of the Project Agreement(s) (however, no new Project Agreements shall be undertaken after the original MOU expiration date). This MOU shall be reviewed in its final year and may be extended by mutual written agreement of the parties.

Language of Execution

Although all languages are deemed equally authentic, should this MOU be executed in more than one language, the English version shall control in the event of inconsistency in meaning or interpretation of terms. All notices, communications and proceedings under this MOU shall be delivered/conducted in English.

Entire Agreement/Modification

This MOU constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and may be amended only in writing signed by all parties.

STUDENT TRANSFER AGREEMENT

Between

**ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY FACULTY OF AGRICULTURE, LIFE, AND
ENVIRONMENT SCIENCES**

and

CORNELL UNIVERSITY COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND LIFE SCIENCES

This agreement creates a cooperative transfer and education program between the Faculty of Agriculture, Life, and Environment Sciences (FALES) at Zhejiang University and the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences (CALS) at Cornell University. This agreement is designed for students enrolled at FALES to pursue transfer admission to CALS to earn their B.S. degree.

1. Admission to CALS will follow the standard Cornell University and CALS application and admission procedures for transfer students, including an endorsement of the students by FALES. Final decision for admission of FALES transfer students is made by the CALS Undergraduate Admissions Committee. CALS will determine how many students can be admitted into each major, to appropriately manage enrollment.

Each year, up to 10 students will be admitted into CALS majors, except for Applied Economics and Management and Biological Sciences. Applicants to Applied Economics and Management and Biological Sciences will be reviewed and considered by the CALS Admissions Committee on a case by case basis, with relevance to the College mission in mind.

2. Students at FALES will need to complete all requirements for transfer admission to be considered:
 - Complete required courses for intended CALS major with the equivalent of a B or better earned in each course. Required courses can be found at www.cals.cornell.edu/cals/prospective/admissions/applying/transfer/coursework.cfm
 - Earn the equivalent of a minimum 3.0/B grade point college average
 - Complete the Cornell transfer application and meet all Fall admission deadlines
 - Demonstrate solid interest and fit in the CALS major in which applying
 - Study full time in college prior to transfer
 - A solid command of English, a minimum score of 100 on the TOEFL/iBT exam. All applicants are required to take the TOEFL exam.
3. Students from FALES, who are granted transfer admission to CALS, will enter with full junior status and will have the opportunity to complete a Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree with an additional 60 credits earned at Cornell University.
4. Enrolled students must complete the academic requirements of CALS and the admitting major.

5. Enrolled students are subject to the academic standards of CALS. A cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.00 or above must be maintained at Cornell University and CALS requirements met (i.e., at least 12 credits and one CALS course per semester). Students who are not in good academic standing may be dismissed.
6. Enrolled students must abide by campus behavior as set forth in the Campus Code for Academic Conduct. Students who are not in good standing may be dismissed at the discretion of CALS and/or Cornell University. In such instances, there will be appropriate consultation in a timely manner with FALES before final action is taken.
7. A CALS faculty member in the student's major will provide academic advisement during their time in the College.
8. Cornell University Financial Aid is not guaranteed. While Cornell is now able to provide financial aid to a broader range of international students, we are not able to provide assistance to all international students who apply for and may be eligible for financial aid. International students awarded financial aid are selected based on enrollment priorities established by the University.



9. Upon successful completion of the academic program at Cornell University within CALS, the student will be recommended to the faculty of CALS for the Bachelor of Science (B.S.) degree.
10. This transfer cooperative agreement will be instituted for a five-year period, with renewal upon favorable evaluations by both institutions.

**GLOBAL STUDY PROGRAM WORKING AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY
AND
UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, DAVIS**

In conformity with the Agreement of Cooperation between the University of California, Davis and Zhejiang University (UC Davis Agreement of Cooperation # Year-Number), this Working Agreement allows students from Zhejiang University to study at the University of California, Davis under the auspices of the Global Study Program.

1. Definitions

- a) For the purposes of this agreement, “home” institution refers to the institution at which students intend to graduate, and “host” institution refers to the institution which has agreed to accept the students from the home institution.
- b) The UC Davis Global Study Program is an academic study program that allows students from select foreign institutions which share a partnership agreement to enroll in regular UC Davis courses on a full-time, non-degree basis.

2. Purposes of the Agreement

- a) The general purpose of the agreement is to promote educational and cultural cooperation between the partnering institutions and countries.
- b) The purpose of the Global Study Program is to enable students to enroll in courses at the host institution for credit which will be applied towards their degree at the home institution, as well as further students’ academic and cultural enrichment and personal growth.

3. Length of Study

Students can stay at the host institution for a minimum of one quarter (11 weeks) up to one full year (four quarters or 12 months).

4. Responsibilities of the Host Institution

- a) The host institution agrees to accept and enroll students as full-time, non-degree students for the duration of the agreement.
- b) The host institution will allow Global Study students to enroll in a broad range of courses in nearly all the colleges and departments across campus.

- c) The host institution will provide each student with an Orientation Program and ongoing academic oversight, advising and support. Program advisors also maintain close coordination with the home institution.
- d) The host institution will provide intensive English language and pre-academic courses for Global Study students as needed.
- e) The host institution will provide each student with access to UC Davis facilities and privileges, including but not limited to: libraries, sports and recreational facilities, the university transportation system, and the student health center.
- f) The host institution is responsible for sending course transcripts to the home institution and Global Study students, including the subject titles, credits, and grades.
- g) In the administration of the Global Study Program, the host institution will not be expected to take any action which will be contrary to its academic regulations and practices.

5. Responsibilities of the Home Institution

- a) The home institution will select students for the Global Study Program with high academic standing at their home institution (i.e., a grade point average of a B or better and the recommendation of their home university) and demonstrated academic preparation for college-level academic study in English.
- b) The home institution will have the responsibility for all matters concerning the transfer and recognition of credits for coursework taken at the host institution.

6. Responsibilities of Global Study Students

- a) Global Study students are responsible for meeting the host institution's academic standards.
- b) It will be the responsibility of each student to obtain official recognition from his or her home institution for credits earned at the host institution.
- c) Global Study students are responsible for adhering to all US legal requirements in order to maintain their immigration status, including continuous registration as full-time students.
- d) Global Study students will be responsible for ensuring that the following fees are paid:
 - Tuition and program fees
 - Travel to and from the host institution

- Course materials and textbooks
- Travel documentation and visas
- Housing and other living expenses
- Medical insurance coverage

Students will be responsible for obtaining medical/health insurance coverage to the satisfaction of the host institution.

7. Student Conduct

Global Study students will be subject to the rules and regulations of the host institution. Any breach of these rules will be dealt with in accordance with the disciplinary policy of the host university.

8. Accommodation

Every effort will be made to assist students to obtain housing within a reasonable distance of the host campus. Students must be aware that they are responsible for all costs associated with housing.

9. Responsible Administrative Personnel

The UC Davis Global Study Program is administered by UC Davis Extension. UC Davis Extension provides academic oversight, facilitates the application and registration process, and distributes transcripts.

The designated operational units of the parties, for purposes of administering the terms of this agreement are:

For UC Davis:	Beth Greenwood Chair, Global Education, Law, and Public Policy UC Davis Extension
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For Zhejiang University:	LI Min Deputy Director, Office of International Relations Zhejiang University
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Either party may change its designated operational officer by written notification to the designated operational officer of the other party.


10. Period of Agreement

Program details are outlined in Attachment A, and will be updated on an annual basis and as needed.



WORKING AGREEMENT

BETWEEN

**THE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES
UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, DAVIS**

AND

ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY, CHINA

The College of Agricultural and Environmental Sciences (CA&ES), University of California, Davis (UCD), and Zhejiang University (ZU), in China, wishing to continue existing cooperative relations and to strengthen collaborative partnership in the development and success of the 985 *Institute of Agricultural & Environmental Science (985 program)*, agree as follows:

PART I

SCOPE OF THE COOPERATION

This agreement is a supplement to existing memorandum and agreements established between ZU and UCD. This cooperation will be coordinated from the Office of International Programs (CA & ES) and the Office of the Vice President for Research and International Programs - ZU, and will involve faculty drawn primarily, though not exclusively, from ZU and from CA & ES at UC Davis. Other departments or units at either institution, as well as external scientists, may participate at any time by mutual consent. A list of contact persons of both parties is attached as annex to this agreement.

Subject to mutual consent, areas of cooperation addressed by this agreement, include any program offered at either university with potential to contribute to the mission and effectiveness of *985 Institute of Agricultural & Environmental Science*

The terms of mutual cooperation and the necessary budget for each program and activity implemented under the terms of this agreement shall be discussed and agreed upon mutually in writing by both parties prior to the initiation of the particular program or activity, and each program and activity shall be negotiated on an annual basis. Each university will designate Liaison Officers to develop and coordinate specific activities or programs.

PART II

ESTABLISHMENT OF THE 985 GUIDING COMMITTEE

ZU and UCD agree to jointly establish a 985 guiding committee (see Part III below), which will have the following responsibilities:

1. Development of the protocols for the decision making process covering the following responsibilities:
 - Selection of major research programs within the existing 7 major categories of the 985

activity

- Selection of participating scientists to participate in the 985 program
- Selection of major instruments and major research facility investments (laboratories, research facilities, field facilities etc.)

2. Coordination of 985 program implementation:

Consistent with the principles established in Item 1 above, and consistent with the intent of the approved 985 program, the 985 guiding committee will oversee the following activities:

- Selection of Principal Research Areas
 - Selection of Principal ZU Scientists and UCD Visiting Professors
 - Selection of major research instruments and major research facilities (laboratories, research facilities, field facilities etc.)
3. Development of the protocols for program review
4. Development of new collaborative programs

PART III

985 COMMITTEE STRUCTURE AND FUNCTION

1. ZU and UCD will each nominate one person to serve as overall 985 committee chairpersons.
2. For each of the seven principal research areas identified in the approved 985 documents ZU will nominate and select one chair person.
3. For each of the seven principal research areas identified in the approved 985 document UCD will be invited to nominate one chair person to serve as co-Chair with the ZU representative. UCD may choose to not nominate a chairperson for any individual principal research area in which case the ZU chairperson shall have principal responsibility for decisions in that research area.
4. The 958 program guiding committee will consist of the overall chairs, and the chairs of each of the 7 research areas.
5. The role of the each chairperson is to broadly represent the breadth of personnel and research programs of their home institution with the goal of maximizing the effectiveness and success of the 985 program.

6. Each co-chairperson may develop a sub-committee to assist with their decision making processes and may designate a member of that sub-committee to serve as acting chair in their absence. The acting chair will have all rights and privileges normally accorded to the chair.
7. To ensure uniformity of process all discussions will be conducted on a committee basis and the entire committee must ratify all decisions.
8. In the event of any disagreement the matter will be referred to the ZU University Academic Committee for resolution.

A. RESPONSIBILITIES OF UC DAVIS

1. UC Davis agrees to participate as the principal partner with ZU in the 985 program and resolves to serve as committed and involved partners in this activity.
2. UC Davis will provide ZU with the names and Curriculum Vitae of all proposed chairs and co-chairs by August 1, 2005. A preliminary list is attached to this document. The selection of UCD personnel may be changed at any time by mutual consent of the parties.
3. UC Davis makes no pledge to provide financial support for this initiative but may choose to provide funding, in-kind and other support instruments at its own discretion.
4. The UC Davis chairperson will serve as liaison officer and principal coordinator of UCD participation in this activity.
5. UC Davis will respect all normal professional standards of shared authorship and intellectual property rights.

B. RESPONSIBILITIES OF ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY

1. Zhejiang University agrees to treat UCD as the principal partner with ZU in the 985 program and resolves to serve as committed and involved partners in this activity.
2. Zhejiang University will provide UCD with the names and Curriculum Vitae of all proposed chairs and co-chairs. The selection of ZU personnel may be changed at any time by mutual consent of the parties.
3. To assist UCD in the identification of key faculty partners and development of research partnerships, Zhejiang University commits to provide UCD with a detailed English summary of key research capabilities and regional research priorities relevant to this 985 program.
4. Zhejiang University agrees to cover the in-country costs (excluding salary) incurred by approved UCD faculty participating in this program at ZU. The details of this support will be agreed upon prior to the departure of the UCD faculty from Davis, California. Additional support for long term or specialized activities may be provided by negotiation.
5. Zhejiang University agrees to provide approved UCD faculty with Visiting Professor status and to allow UCD Visiting Professors to serve with ZU faculty as co-supervisors of students and co-Principal investigators on research grants. There is no expectation of financial support of ZU students by UCD visiting professors.
6. Zhejiang University will respect all normal professional standards of shared authorship and intellectual property rights.

C. SHARED RESPONSIBILITIES

1. An open and collegial communication is expected and may be conducted by physical or electronic communication.
2. Subject to availability of funding the partners will strive to conduct an annual partnership meeting.
3. Both partners commit to the importance of this initiative and will, upon request, provide formal recognition to all participants that the participant may use to supplement their application for merit and promotion decisions.

PART IV

RENEWAL, TERMINATION AND AMENDMENT

This agreement shall remain in force for a period of three (3) years from the date of the last signature, with the understanding that it may be terminated by either party giving notice to the other party in writing no later than the end of March in any year. The agreement may be renewed by mutual consent of the two parties.


This agreement may be amended by the exchange of letters between the two institutions. Such amendments, once approved by both institutions, will become part of this Working Agreement.

In the event that an item of this agreement is deemed inapplicable due to certain prevailing juridical decisions or legislative acts, the parties will seek alternative agreements on this item. However, all other applicable items of this agreement will remain in force until the agreement is terminated or discontinued.





This agreement is to formalize the academic exchange between Zhejiang University (hereafter referred to as ZJU) and the University of California, Davis (hereafter referred to as UC Davis) for a 3+X Master's Degree program. The two institutions subscribe to the statement of principles and procedures given below based on a spirit of cooperation and reciprocity, for the mutual benefit of both parties.

THE 3+X MASTER'S DEGREE PROGRAM

Selected undergraduate students who have completed three (3) years' course studies at ZJU may apply for the Master's degree programs (non-thesis) at UC Davis. UC Davis policy does not permit students who have not completed their undergraduate degrees to be admitted into graduate programs. In order to facilitate the acceptance of these students into graduate programs, in the fall of their fourth year the students will attend UC Davis in the UC Davis Extension Global Study Program. The courses taken in the first quarter will complete their undergraduate degree requirements at ZJU. The courses may also count toward a master's degree at UC Davis. However, course units may only be counted toward one degree.

Following successful completion of their courses in UC Davis Extension's Global Study Program, the students will receive a statement from ZJU indicating that they have satisfied the requirements for their undergraduate degrees. Once this statement is received students may officially be admitted to Master's Programs at UC Davis. ZJU students who have completed all four years of education with BS degrees can also participate in this program and may start their Master's program directly in the first quarter.

The typical non-thesis Master's programs at UC Davis require 36 quarter credits, depending on the specific discipline. It is required by UC Davis that students must be registered as Master's program students for a minimum of 3 academic quarters (two summer session terms are equivalent to one quarter).

The number of admitted students may be negotiated by both parties on an annual basis. The initial goal is to have 10-15 students during fall of 2010 and then increase thereafter (see the appendix for the Master's degree currently offered at UC Davis).

RESPONSIBILITIES AND PROCEDURES:

- 1) UC Davis will evaluate those selected ZJU students for their qualifications using UC Davis' admission standards as determined by the graduate program of interest and UC Davis Extension's Global Study Program.
- 2) ZJU will select highly qualified third year students with an overall average GPA of 3.25/4.00 or higher over the three years' studies. ZJU will also make an official written recommendation confirming the students have successfully passed the ZJU evaluation.
- 3) The minimum TOEFL score required to participate in the 3+X program at UC Davis is 550 for the paper test, 213 for the computer-based test, and 80 for the Internet-based test. The minimum IELTS score is at least 7 on a 9-point scale. The students should also take the GRE test if the programs they applied to have such requirements. Selected ZJU students who meet the admission qualifications of UC Davis and the degree program to which they are applying will be admitted to UC Davis.
- 4) ZJU will assist and facilitate students admitted by UC Davis to process paperwork related to visa applications. After completion of their first quarter's credits, ZJU will promptly provide a statement indicating the issue of their BS from ZJU upon completion of the bachelor degree requirements.
- 5) UC Davis will set the fees annually. ZJU students will pay tuition and living expenses during their studies at UC Davis.
- 6) UC Davis will provide academic advisers to the students to assist with choosing courses and registration. UC Davis will also provide appropriate orientation schedules after the students arrive at campus. UC Davis may provide guidance and logistical help with student housing and other relevant arrangements.
- 7) Upon successful completion of all degree requirements ZJU students will be granted Master's degrees by UC Davis. Some selected ZJU students may continue one year for Master of Science degree program (thesis required) if they meet UC Davis requirements and faculty can provide financial support for a research assistantship.
- 8) ZJU students who choose to continue their Ph.D. program at UC Davis will be required to apply for a change of degree objective following the normal procedures set by UC Davis.
- 9) ZJU students who return to ZJU with their UC Davis Master's degrees may enter ZJU's Ph.D. programs should they meet the relevant requirements set by ZJU.

GENERAL AGREEMENT

- 1) This Agreement represents the entire understanding between the two parties and supersedes all other arrangements. This Agreement may only be changed with the written consent of both parties.
- 2) If either party shall temporarily fail to enforce any provision of this Agreement unless a variation in accordance with the above such temporary forbearance shall not constitute a waiver.
- 3) The two parties shall be in regular communication to resolve any problems or issues relating to this agreement.
- 4) Neither party may assign, transfer or sub-contract its commitments under this Agreement.
- 5) Either party may terminate this Agreement if the other shall be in material breach and following written notice of such breach shall not have remedied the breach within a period of 30 days.
- 6) Either party may terminate this Agreement for any reason upon 9 months prior written notice to the other.
- 7) This Agreement shall remain subject to laws and regulations of both countries.

**SUMMER RESEARCH PROGRAM WORKING AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY
AND
UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, DAVIS**

In conformity with the Agreement of Cooperation between the University of California, Davis and Zhejiang University (UC Davis Agreement of Cooperation No.), this Working Agreement allows students from Zhejiang University for research training in select faculty laboratories at the University of California, Davis under the auspices of the UC Davis-Zhejiang University Summer Research Program.

1. Definitions

- a) For the purposes of this agreement, “home” institution refers to the institution at which students intend to graduate, and “host” institution refers to the institution which has agreed to accept the students from the home institution.
- b) The UC Davis-Zhejiang University is an academic research program that allows undergraduate and graduate students from Zhejiang University to participate in research activities at select faculty laboratories at UC Davis for a short-term basis (10-week duration or less) during the summer.

2. Purposes of the Agreement

- a) The general purpose of the agreement is to promote educational and cultural cooperation between the two universities and countries.
- b) The objectives of the UC Davis-Zhejiang University Summer Research Program are: to develop a global research education hub at UC Davis, to establish a research alliance in strategic research directions, to promote leading research programs at UC Davis, and to train the next generation of international leaders in key scientific fields.

3. Research Areas

Students will be placed in participating faculty laboratories in the field of micro-nano bioengineering. In addition, students may be placed in other leading areas of research at UC Davis, such as agricultural and environmental sciences, energy research, and the biological sciences.

4. Length of Study

Students can stay at the host institution for a maximum of ten weeks during the summer.

5. Responsibilities of the Host Institution

The host institution will:

- a) Accept Zhejiang University students for research training in select faculty laboratories for the duration of the agreement.
- b) Match students with faculty with similar research expertise to the extent that this is feasible.
- c) Allow students to participate in research training in research laboratories among participating, interested faculty in a variety of research fields.
- d) Provide students with an orientation program, ongoing faculty mentorship, graduation ceremony, and logistical support.
- e) Accept students who meet the admission criteria, including a B grade point average, demonstrated interest in the relevant fields of research, strong language and communication skills, and the recommendation of the home institution.

6. Responsibilities of the Home Institution

The home institution agrees to:

- a) Recommend students who are in good standing at the home institution and who meet the admission criteria.
- b) Recommend students whose research interests are compatible with the participating faculty at the host institution.
- c) Send official transcripts and original language test reports with each application documenting a minimum B grade point average equivalent (3.0 on a 4.0 grade scale), compatible research interests, and demonstrated academic preparation for research training.

7. Student Responsibilities

Zhejiang University students are responsible for:

- a) Meeting the host institution's academic standards.
- b) Adhering to all US legal requirements in order to maintain their immigration status, including continuous registration as full-time students.
- c) Ensuring that the following fees are paid:
 - Program Fees
 - Travel to and from the host institution
 - Travel documentation and visas

- Housing and other living expenses
- Medical insurance coverage

Students will be responsible for obtaining medical/health insurance coverage to the satisfaction of the host institution.

8. Student Conduct

Students will be subject to the rules and regulations of the host institution. Any breach of these rules will be dealt with in accordance with the disciplinary policy of the host university.

9. Accommodation

Every effort will be made to assist students to obtain housing within a reasonable distance of the host campus.

10. Responsible Administrative Personnel

The UC Davis-Zhejiang University Summer Research Program is administered by UC Davis Extension. UC Davis Extension provides academic oversight, facilitates the application and payment process, and overall coordination of the program.

Either party may change its designated operational officer by written notification to the designated operational officer of the other party.


11. Period of Agreement







**A COOPERATIVE EDUCATION PROGRAM AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
THE UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS AT URBANA-CHAMPAIGN, USA
AND
ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY
IN
HANGZHOU, CHINA**

This Cooperative Education Program Agreement (“Agreement”) is between The Board of Trustees of the University of Illinois, acting through its Urbana-Champaign campus in Urbana, Illinois, U.S.A., acting on behalf of its Departments of Agricultural and Biological Engineering and Food Science and Human Nutrition, in its College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences (“ILLINOIS”), and Zhejiang University, in Hangzhou, China (“ZJU”). The purpose of this Agreement is to establish a 3+2 cooperative bachelor/master degree program (“Program”) between the two institutions, and stipulate the terms and conditions for the administration of this Program.

ARTICLE 1: PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

1.1 The institutions agree to institute a cooperative education program whereby qualified students may earn a specified bachelor’s degree from ZJU and a specified master’s degree from ILLINOIS by completing three years of coursework at ZJU and two years of coursework at ILLINOIS (plus one optional summer research internship).

1.2 At ZJU, the participants in the Program will be limited to enrollment in existing Bachelor of Science degree programs in Food Science and Human Nutrition or in Biosystems Engineering.

1.3 At ILLINOIS, the participants in the Program will be limited to enrollment in existing master’s degree programs in Food Science and Human Nutrition or in Agricultural and Biological Engineering (that do not include the Professional Science Master’s Program concentrations).

1.4 Students who have been accepted by and enrolled at ZJU as undergraduate students will complete six semesters of the usual eight-semester Bachelor of Science program at ZJU. If accepted into the Program, students will be permitted by ZJU to complete their final two semesters of study towards the ZJU Bachelor of Science degree at ILLINOIS, while enrolled in the first year of study towards the ILLINOIS Master of Science degree.

1.5 Credits earned for courses successfully completed at ILLINOIS will be applied toward students’ Master of Science degree from ILLINOIS according to standard policies and practices at ILLINOIS. Credits earned for courses successfully completed at ILLINOIS may be applied toward students’ ZJU Bachelor of Science degree at the discretion of, and according to the policies and standards established by, ZJU. Credit from a single course may not be applied to both degrees; all the courses completed at ILLINOIS and applied to a B.S. degree at ZJU will not be applied towards an M.S. degree at ILLINOIS.

1.6 The two institutions have established independently their own degree completion requirements for both the Bachelor of Science degree program at ZJU and the Master of Science degree program at ILLINOIS. Students participating in the Program must satisfy all degree requirements of both institutions in order to successfully complete the Program and be awarded both credentials.

1.7 The two institutions have established independently their own minimum qualifications, application review criteria, and prerequisite requirements for all applicants to both the Bachelor of Science degree at ZJU and the Master of Science degree at ILLINOIS. Both institutions will apply these existing requirements and criteria in determining the acceptability of all applicants to the Program.

ARTICLE 2: NUMBERS

2.1 The number of students admitted to the Program may be negotiated by the institutions on an annual basis, and will be contingent upon number of qualified applicants, number of spaces available in the specified undergraduate or graduate programs at either institution, or other considerations.

2.2 For the first semester of the Program, beginning in August 2011, the institutions plan on admitting up to a total of ten (10) qualified ZJU students.

ARTICLE 3: NOMINATION OF PARTICIPANTS AND ENROLLMENT

3.1 ZJU will screen students in their second year of undergraduate education for potential participation in the program, and recommend these candidates to ILLINOIS.

3.2 All potential candidates for participation in the Program must:

3.2.1 have completed 85% of their degree requirements for a Bachelor of Science degree from ZJU, by the time of their enrollment at ILLINOIS.

3.2.2 satisfy the minimum English language proficiency requirements for acceptance into graduate programs at ILLINOIS. This minimum proficiency may be demonstrated by providing official score reports from a Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or from a International English Language Testing System (IELTS) examination taken within the previous two years from the date of application. Currently, international applicants for graduate study at ILLINOIS qualify for full status admission if they have obtained at least the following scores:

TOEFL: greater than 610 (paper-based test); greater than 253 (computer-based test); or
greater than 102 (internet-based test)
IELTS: greater than 6.5

Applicants may be qualified for limited admission status if they have obtained at least the following scores:

TOEFL: 550 (paper-based test); 213 (computer-based test); or 79 (internet-based test)
IELTS: 6.5 or lower, and/or a score of less than 6 on any sub-section

3.3 At ILLINOIS, students accepted into the Program must have enrolled in their third-year of study at ZJU. These students will be admitted conditionally as graduate students in the Master of Science in Agricultural and Biological Engineering or the Master of Science in Food Science and Human Nutrition degree programs, pending the completion of their Bachelor of Science degree at ZJU. Students accepted into this Program will not be eligible to enroll in the Professional Science Master's (PSM) degree program at ILLINOIS.

3.4 Upon completion of the second year of undergraduate studies at ZJU, students admitted into the Program may apply to participate in a summer Research Experience for Undergraduates ("REU") at ILLINOIS. As part of this REU, participating students will engage in ongoing research by ILLINOIS faculty in the Department of Agricultural and Biological Engineering or in the Department of Food Science and Human Nutrition. Laboratory costs associated with hosting participating students will be borne by the hosting department/faculty at ILLINOIS; all other costs associated with this REU will be the responsibility of the participating students.

3.5 Upon completion of their first semester of study at ILLINOIS, students participating in the Program may petition their host department at ILLINOIS to convert their Master of Science degree program from a non-thesis program to a Master of Science degree with thesis option. Acceptance into a thesis-option program will be at the discretion of the host department at ILLINOIS, and contingent on the students' academic performance.

3.6 Students who successfully complete the program may apply for admittance to a Ph.D. program at either ILLINOIS or ZJU, and will be subject to the same application procedures, admission requirements, and review criterion as all other applicants to the selected program.

ARTICLE 4: RESPONSIBILITIES OF ILLINOIS

4.1 ILLINOIS will provide ZJU with the information and materials necessary to advertise and promote this Cooperative Education Program among their undergraduate students.

4.2 ILLINOIS will accept applicants from ZJU and to enroll them as full-time, degree-seeking graduate students in the regular Master of Science degree program in either Agricultural and Biological Engineering or Food Science and Human Nutrition, provided those candidates meet the normal standards and criteria for admission to the programs.

4.3 ILLINOIS agrees to accept applications from ZJU undergraduate students for enrollment in one of the two specified Master of Science degree programs at ILLINOIS, prior to completion of their Bachelor of Science degree program at ZJU, with the understanding that the participating students will enroll at ILLINOIS in their first two semesters of graduate study concurrently with the completion of their last two semesters of undergraduate study at ILLINOIS. ZJU undergraduate students participating in the Program will not be eligible to complete the Master of Science degree program at ILLINOIS unless and until they have been awarded a Bachelor of Science degree by ZJU.

4.4 ILLINOIS agrees to provide ZJU with a report of courses completed and grades attained by each participating student during the first two semesters of their study at ILLINOIS, upon the request of the student. ZJU will assign credit toward each student's ZJU Bachelor of Science degree program at their own discretion and according to their own policies and procedures.

ARTICLE 5: RESPONSIBILITIES OF ZJU

5.1 ZJU agrees to advertise and promote the Program among their students, and to encourage and facilitate applications to the program by outstanding students.

5.2 ZJU agrees to provide ILLINOIS with a roster of applicants to the program by January 15th of the year of intended enrollment.

5.3 ZJU agrees to award a Bachelor of Science degree to students participating in this program upon successful completion of their first two semesters of coursework at ILLINOIS, provided that the students have satisfied all other academic requirements and financial obligations established by ZJU for completion of the degree program.

ARTICLE 6: FINANCE AND SERVICES

6.1 Students participating in the Program will be required to register as full-time, degree-seeking students each semester, and will be subject to the standard tuition and fees assessed by the institution hosting the students during the semester. At ILLINOIS, ZJU students will be responsible for full, non-resident tuition and fees, as assessed to all other non-resident enrollees.

6.2 The Host Institutions will not be responsible for the following costs incurred by participating students:

- 6.2.1 transportation to and from the Host Institution;
- 6.2.2 room and board expenses;
- 6.2.3 textbooks, clothing, and personal expenses;
- 6.2.4 student service fees, including adequate health insurance coverage, which are typically assessed to all full-time students by the institution hosting the student in any given semester;
- 6.2.5 passport and visa costs; and
- 6.2.6 all other debts incurred during the course of the year.

ARTICLE 7: DURATION

This Agreement shall remain in force for a period of five (5) years from the date of the last signature, with the understanding that it may be terminated by either institution providing sixty (60) days' advance written notice to the other. Students participating in this program at the time of the intended termination will be permitted to complete their program at ILLINOIS under the terms of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 8: GENERAL MATTERS

8.1 **USE OF NAMES.** Neither institution will use the name of the other in any form of advertising or publicity without the other's express written permission. ZJU must seek permission from ILLINOIS by submitting the proposed use, well in advance of any deadline, to the Associate Chancellor for Public Affairs, University of Illinois, Third Floor Swanlund Administration Building, 601 East John Street, Champaign, IL, 61820 USA; fax (217) 244-7124.

8.2 **AMENDMENTS.** The institutions may amend this Agreement only by writing, and signed by each institution's authorized signatory.

8.3 **COUNTERPARTS.** The institutions may sign this Agreement in counterparts, all of which together constitute the complete Agreement.



MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT FOR “3+X” PROGRAM

BETWEEN

**NORTH CAROLINA STATE UNIVERSITY
RALEIGH, NC, U. S. A.**

AND

**ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY
HANGZHOU, CHINA**

This Agreement is to formalize the academic exchange between North Carolina State University (hereafter referred to as NC State) and Zhejiang University (hereafter referred to as ZJU) for a 3+X Master's program. The two institutions subscribe to the statement of principles and procedures given below and to the terms of agreement regarding the responsibilities of each institution. This agreement is based on a spirit of cooperation, reciprocity, and of mutual benefit to both parties.

Both Universities wish to enter into an arrangement as set forth below:

1. Undergraduate students who complete three (3) years' course studies at ZJU and one semester of studies at NC State that result in a BS degree from ZJU may be considered for enrollment in an NC State Master's degree program (non-thesis) (hereafter referred to as the Program).
2. The Program may be completed in one additional year plus one summer session. Some degrees may require a total of 3 or more semesters due to some graduate courses not being offered in summer sessions, any necessary pre-requisite courses, or optional elective courses the student may take.
3. Admission to the Master's program is contingent upon the student meeting the relevant entry requirements as established by NC State and the degree program to which they are applying.
4. Upon successful completion of NC State's Master's program, ZJU students may be accepted into ZJU's PhD programs provided they pass the relevant entry exam set by ZJU.

Both Universities have agreed to the terms and conditions stated below.

ENTRY AGREEMENT FOR 3+X PROGRAM

- (1) ZJU will select qualified rising senior students at the end of their first semester in their third year of education to attend NC State for their fourth year of study. ZJU students need to have:
 - a) completed the third year of the BS program at ZJU and achieved an overall GPA (Grade Point Average) of more than 3.0 on a 4.0 scale;
 - b) obtained minimum requirement for TOEFL or IELTS scores needed for

- admission into graduate program at NC State as listed online;
- c) obtained an official written recommendation statement from ZJU confirming the student has successfully passed the ZJU evaluation.
- (2) ZJU students who have completed all four (4) years' of education and have received their BS degrees may apply for masters programs through the regular application process.
- (3) NC State will evaluate those selected ZJU students using NC State's admission standards for their qualifications. NC State faculty may conduct an on-site interview to ensure student quality. The selected ZJU students who meet both NC State and the Program's entry qualifications will be admitted to NC State as "GTI Certificate students" in the Global Training Initiative (GTI) program. Annually the parties will negotiate the number of admitted students.
- (4) This 3+X Master's program is open only for participating degree programs offered by NC State, as listed online at <http://www.ncsu.edu/grad/zhejiang/3+X.html>.
- (5) As NC State's policy will not allow admitting students into graduate programs prior to completion of their BS degrees, these admitted students will first apply to and matriculate via the GTI Certificate Program for the first (fall) semester (and may come during an optional "early start" program in July). As GTI Certificate students they will be expected to register full-time (minimum 12 credit hours) and to take the required courses that are designed for the specific Program as well as the required GTI 401 Colloquium. Credit and non-credit English courses are also available during this first semester and students will have the opportunity to take the TOEFL or other standardized tests after arrival, by October 15. The GTI has a separate on-line application process, which must be completed before a student visa certificate can be issued. See <http://www.ncsu.edu/gti> for more information.
- (6) After they have successfully completed the course work needed to complete their BS degree (minimum 12 credit hours) as GTI Certificate students at NC State, ZJU will grant each of these students a statement that the student has completed BS degree requirements in their respective discipline by ZJU. Students will be required to provide an official letter from ZJU indicating the BS degree requirements are satisfied prior to being approved for the Program. They must also provide a final transcript once the BS degree has been conferred.
- (7) NC State will officially admit ZJU students (change status) to the Program in different disciplines following the guidelines and requirements of each Master's degree program at NC State. The typical non-thesis Master's program at NC State requires 30-36 credit hours, depending on the specific discipline. NC State requires that the last 18 credit hours for a Master's degree have to be taken after students have been admitted into the Master's program at NC State.

- (8) ZJU students will pay out-of-state tuition, fees and living expenses during their studies at NC State. The Graduate School and the NC State Cashiers Office provide current rates online (<http://www.fis.ncsu.edu/cashier/>). To complete the Program in one (1) year, it is anticipated that students may also need to register for a minimum of six (6) credits during the Summer Session(s). NC State may provide guidance and logistical help with student housing and other relevant arrangements. The amount of living expenses may vary depending on the type of housing and living preferences.
- (9) Upon successful completion of all course requirements in each of the Programs, ZJU students will be granted Master's degrees by NC State. Some selected ZJU students may continue for one additional year in the Master of Science degree program (thesis required) if they meet NC State requirements and some faculty may provide financial support for research assistantships.
- (10) ZJU students who return to ZJU with their Master's degree may enter ZJU's Ph.D. programs should they meet the relevant requirements set by ZJU.
- (11) ZJU students who choose to continue their Ph.D. program at NC State will be required to apply following the normal application procedures and admission requirements set by NC State.
- (12) Some of the required courses for Master's degrees may be taken as Distance Education courses offered by NC State (maximum of three credits per semester), which will be counted toward the total credit hours required for the completion of Master's degree programs.


GENERAL AGREEMENT

- 7) Subject to the governing law of each Institutions' jurisdiction regarding public records, the Institutions agree not to use or disclose to anyone information belonging to the other party which is disclosed in connection with this Agreement which is of confidential nature and agree not to make any announcements of any nature in respect of this Agreement without the consent of the other party hereto.
- 8) Either party may terminate this Agreement for any reason upon nine (9) months' prior written notice to the other.
- 9) This Agreement shall remain subject to laws and regulations of both countries.





MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT FOR “3+1” PROGRAM

BETWEEN
ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY
HANGZHOU, CHINA

AND
NORTH CAROLINA STATE UNIVERSITY
RALEIGH, NC, U. S. A.

This Agreement is to formalize the academic exchange between Zhejiang University (hereafter referred to as ZJU) and North Carolina State University (hereafter referred to as NCSU) for a 3+1 Master's program. The two institutions subscribe to the statement of principles and procedures given below and to the terms of agreement regarding the responsibilities that each institution undertakes as its part of the reciprocal exchange. This agreement is based on a spirit of cooperation, reciprocity, and of mutual benefit to both parties.

Both Universities wish to enter into an arrangement whereby undergraduate students who completed three years' (3) course studies at ZJU and one semester of studies at NCSU that result in a BS degree from ZJU may enroll onto Master's degree programs (non-thesis) that may be completed in one additional semester plus one summer session. Admission to the Master's program is contingent upon the student meeting the relevant entry requirements as established by NCSU and the degree program to which they are applying. Upon successful completion of NCSU's Master's program in one year, ZJU students may be accepted into ZJU's PhD programs should they pass the relevant entry exam set by ZJU. Both Universities have agreed the terms and conditions stated below.

ENTRY AGREEMENT FOR 3+1 PROGRAM

- (1) ZJU will select qualified rising senior students (top 10%) at the end of their third year of education to attend NCSU for their fourth year of study. ZJU students need to have:
(1) completed the third year of the ZJU BS program and achieved an overall average score of 85% over the three years studies; (2) obtained either a traditional TOEFL score of 580 (including a score of at least 4.0 in the test of written English) or the equivalent new TOEFL scores as listed on the NCSU website, or equivalent English proficiency; (3) obtained an official written recommendation statement from ZJU confirming the student has successfully passed the ZJU evaluation.
- (2) ZJU students who have completed all four years of education with BS degrees can also participate in this program and will follow the same selection procedures.
- (3) NCSU will evaluate those selected ZJU students using NCSU's admission standards for

their qualifications. The on-site interview may be conducted by NCSU faculty to ensure the student quality. The selected ZJU students who meet NCSU's and the degree program to which they are applying entry qualifications will be admitted to NCSU. The number of admitted students may be negotiated by both parties on a yearly basis. The initial plan is to have about 30 students during fall of 2007 and then increase thereafter.

- (4) As NCSU's policy will not allow admitting students prior to completion of their BS degrees into graduate programs, these admitted students will be considered as special students for the first semester. As special students they will be expected to register full-time (minimum 12 credit hours) and to take the required courses that are designed for the specific Master's programs.
- (5) After they have successfully complete the some course work (minimum 12 credit hours) as special students at NCSU, ZJU will grant each of these students with a statement that these students have completed BS degree requirements in their respective disciplines by ZJU. Students will be required to provide a final transcript indicating the BS degree was conferred prior to being approved for the Master's degree.
- (6) NCSU will officially admit ZJU students (change status) to Master's degree programs in different disciplines following the guidelines and requirements of each Master's degree program at NCSU. The typical non-thesis Master's programs at NCSU require 30-36 credit hours, depending on the specific discipline. It is required by NCSU's regulation that the last 18 credit hours for a Master's degree have to be taken after students have been admitted into the Master's program at NCSU.
- (7) ZJU students will pay out-of-state tuition and living expenses during their studies at NCSU. The current NCSU graduate non-resident tuition and fees is \$8,675 per semester, for a total of \$17,350 for an academic year with two semesters. To complete the Program in one year, it is anticipated that students may need to register for a minimum of 6 credits during the Summer Session(s). The current tuition and fee rate for 6 credits during summer is \$4,122. NCSU may provide guidance and logistical help in the student housing and other relevant arrangements. Students will cover their own living expenses during their studies at NCSU. The amount of living expenses may vary depending on the type of housing and living preferences.
- (8) Upon successful completion of all course requirements following requirements in each of the Master's programs, ZJU students will be granted Master's degrees by NCSU (see the appendix for the Master's degree currently offered at NCSU). Some selected ZJU students may continue one year for Master of Science degree program (thesis required) if they meet NCSU requirements and faculty can provide financial support for research assistantship.
- (9) ZJU students who return to ZJU with their Master's degrees may enter ZJU's PhD programs should they meet the relevant requirements set by ZJU.
- (10) ZJU students who choose to continue their Ph.D. program at NCSU will be required to

apply following the normal application procedures and admission requirements set by NCSU.

- (11) Some of the required courses for Master's degrees may be taken at ZJU as Distance Education courses offered by NCSU, which will be counted toward to the total credit hours required for the completion of Master's degree programs.
- (12) Initial Master's programs will focus on the existing degree programs offered by the NCSU's College of Agricultural and Life Sciences (see the list for current 21 Master's programs). The specific Master's programs offered in one year may depend on the interests of ZJU students and specific courses availability at NCSU.

Animal Science, Agricultural Education, Bioinformatics, Biological & Agricultural Engineering, Crop Science, Economics, Entomology, Extension Education, Food Science, Fisheries & Wildlife, Functional Genomics, Genetics, Horticultural Science, Microbiology, Nutrition, Physiology, Plant Pathology, Poultry Science, Soil Science, Toxicology and Zoology.



MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT FOR SUMMER RESEARCH

BETWEEN

**ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY
HANGZHOU, CHINA**

AND

**NORTH CAROLINA STATE UNIVERSITY
RALEIGH, NORTH CAROLINA,
UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**

This Agreement is to formalize the academic student exchange between North Carolina State University (NCSU) and Zhejiang University (ZJU) for a summer research program. Both Universities wish to enter into an arrangement whereby NCSU will provide a summer research program for ZJU senior undergraduate students (or beginning graduate students). This summer program, which has been in place at NCSU for eight years, will be offered to selected ZJU students in the summer of 2007 and thereafter. This summer education and research program will expose ZJU students to different research programs and provide opportunities to participate in laboratory research under the guidance of NCSU professors and will provide an opportunity for ZJU students to learn English and American culture. This program is also valuable for NCSU to promote its research programs in different colleges, provide opportunities for faculty, staff and students for international experience and cultural exchange, and recruit high quality graduate students.

The two institutions subscribe to the statement of principles and procedures given below and to the terms of agreement regarding the responsibilities that each institution undertakes as its part of the reciprocal exchange. This agreement is based on a spirit of cooperation, reciprocity, and mutual benefit to both parties.

ENTRY AGREEMENT OF THE RESEARCH PROGRAM

- 1 ZJU will select the best senior students after their third year of education or beginning graduate students to participate in this summer research program. A minimum of 10 students will be required for the program.
- 2 ZJU students will participate in laboratory research at NCSU for up to 4-8 weeks. The dates of the program will be negotiated by both parties (usually from early June to early August).
- 3 ZJU will be responsible for selecting participating students based on the academic performance and proficiency in English. The TOEFL exam is not required, but fluency in English language is absolutely essential. ZJU will provide an official written recommendation statement confirming each student's qualification based the ZJU's evaluation. Each ZJU student will provide a statement to identify one or two research


area(s).

- 4 NCSU professors and research laboratories in various specialties in different colleges will be identified to match up with students' research interests. The research areas may include most research areas at NCSU, for example, the areas of agricultural, biological, engineering, environmental, physical, medical and veterinary sciences.
- 5 NCSU professors who participate in the summer program will open their laboratories for the summer research of ZJU students. Students will conduct research on either a small independent project or assist an ongoing project in the host laboratories.
- 6 Students are required to present their research results jointly with their professors at a research symposium that will be held as the concluding event of the program.
- 7 After ZJU students complete the five week program in their respective laboratories, NCSU will issue each student with a Summer Research Certificate, equivalent to three-credit hours of research experience, which may be transferred to ZJU should ZJU recognize them.
- 8 Room and Board: Air-conditioned rooms will be provided by NCSU, each shared by two students, and a meal plan will be provided by the University Housing and Dining Services. Library, gymnastic, and recreational facilities are available on campus and in the dormitory. Welcome and farewell banquets will be included in the program.
- 9 Insurance: Student insurance will be purchased through the NC State Student Health Insurance Policy.
- 10 Costs: ZJU will provide \$625 support per student. The College of Agricultural and Life Sciences at NCSU will provide \$800 per student for participating in the research program within the college (up to 10 students for 2007). Each student will pay the remaining \$500 per week if the program lasts for less than 6 weeks, and \$2000 total for six weeks, plus the round trip air plane tickets from China to Raleigh (about \$1000).
- 11 The total cost will cover room and board, laboratory supplies, local transportation, library and gymnasium, communications, printing and overhead.
- 12 Payment: NCSU will provide an invoice for the portion responsible by ZJU and student. Half of the total will be paid one month before the program begins. The remaining balance due will be paid when the program begins. Payment by institutional checks is preferred.
- 13 Optional excursion trip can be arranged for students who are interested in visiting Washington, D.C. and the beach of North Carolina with additional costs.

- 1) This Agreement represents the entire understanding between the two parties and supersedes all other arrangements. This Agreement may only be changed with the written consent of both parties.
- 2) The two parties shall be in regular communication to resolve any issues or problems relating to this agreement.
- 3) Either party may terminate this Agreement if the other shall be in material breach and if following written notice of such breach shall not have remedied it within a period of 30 days.
- 4) Either party may terminate this Agreement for any reason upon six months prior written notice to the other.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING
BETWEEN ZHEJIANG UNIVERSITY
AND
THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN

Zhejiang University (ZJU) and the University of Michigan (U-M), in the belief that collaboration will be of mutual benefit to their respective universities, agree to establish the framework by which the parties will work together in an effort to foster and develop a cooperative relationship between the two institutions.

I General Areas of Cooperation

ZJU and U-M agree to promote the following exchange activities based on their respective academic and educational needs:

1. Exchange of faculty and scholars (professors, lecturers, or researchers)
2. Exchange of students (the student number to be discussed)
3. Exchange of academic information and materials
4. Exchange of periodical academic publications
5. Organization of joint research programs
6. Organization of joint conferences
7. Development of joint courses
8. Other academic exchanges agreed upon by both universities

The terms of cooperation for each specific activity implemented under this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) shall be mutually discussed and agreed upon in writing by both parties prior to the initiation of that activity. Any such agreements entered into, as outlined above, will form appendixes to this Memorandum of Understanding.

Nothing shall diminish the full autonomy of either institution, nor will any constraints or financial obligations be imposed by either upon the other in carrying out the MOU.

II Mechanism of the Dialogue

ZJU and U-M agree to explore the feasibility of establishing the dialogue mechanism on a regular basis to deepen the mutual understanding and facilitate academic cooperation. The dialogue participated in by their respective top administrators and distinguished scholars will be carried out every two years on the theme agreed upon by the two parties. The dialogue can be initially launched in the academic field of social sciences and then expand to other disciplines.

III Liaison Officers

Each institution shall designate a liaison officer to develop and coordinate the specific activities agreed upon.



**GENERAL AGREEMENT FOR ACADEMIC COOPERATION
BETWEEN**

**MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY
East Lansing, Michigan, U.S.A.**

AND

**Zhejiang University
Hangzhou, Zhejiang, China**

Michigan State University and Zhejiang University establish this General Agreement to foster international cooperation in education and research.


1. Both parties agree to encourage academic collaboration between the faculty and staff of their institutions, which may include the following activities, intended to promote international academic cooperation:
 - (a) Exchange of materials in education and research, publications, and academic information;
 - (b) Exchange of faculty and research scholars;
 - (c) Exchange of students;
 - (d) Joint research and meetings for education and research;
 - (e) Technical assistance;
 - (f) Creation and marketing of electronic instruction media, including credit and non-credit courses.

Before any of these activities may be implemented, both parties shall discuss the problems involved to the satisfaction of each party and enter into specific activity agreements based on the mutually agreed objectives and outcomes of the activity.

2. This General Agreement shall be applicable to educational and research organizations controlled by either party.
3. This General Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties, and all prior discussions, agreements, and understandings, whether verbal or in writing, are merged in this General Agreement.
4. This General Agreement is not to be deemed to be a contract creating legal and financial relationships between the parties. Rather, it is designed to facilitate and develop a mutually beneficial exchange process and research and educational relationships.


5. This General Agreement shall become effective once it has been signed by both parties and shall continue until terminated by either party by written notice to the other party at least 120 days in advance of the stated termination date. Termination of this General Agreement shall not affect activities in progress pursuant to specific activity agreements, which shall continue until concluded by the parties in accordance with their terms or as otherwise agreed by the parties in writing.
6. The parties intend to review this General Agreement every five years to evaluate the progress and the quality of the mutual cooperation. This General Agreement may be amended only by the written consent of the parties.
7. Both institutions subscribe to a policy of equal opportunity and do not discriminate on the basis of race, color, gender, age, height, weight, marital or familial status, ethnicity, religion, national origin, or disability unrelated to an individual's ability to perform the duties of a particular job or position.
8. Each party shall designate a person or office to serve as liaison for implementing this Agreement.
